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Foreword



THE NATIONAL STATISTICAL REPORT

Introduction

The Constitution Select Committee (COPAC) was set up through Article IV of the Global Political Agreement to spearhead the Constitution making process through a people driven, inclusive and democratic process. The Constitution making process aimed to create conditions for the people of Zimbabwe to write a constitution for themselves being mindful of the need to ensure that the new constitution deepens our values and principles and the protection of the quality of life of all citizens.

In the implementation of the above mandate the following timeframes were provided:

- (i) The Select committee shall be set up within two months of inception of a new government;
- (ii) The convening of the first All Stakeholders Conference shall be within 3 months of the date of the appointment of the Select Committee;
- (iii) The public consultation process shall be completed no later than four months of the date of the first All Stakeholders Conference;
- (iv) The draft Constitution shall be tabled within 3 months of completion of the public consultation process to a second All Stakeholders Conference;
- (v) The draft Constitution and the accompanying Report shall be tabled before Parliament within 1 month of the second All Stakeholders Conference;
- (vi) The draft Constitution and the accompanying report shall be tabled before Parliament and the debate concluded within one month;
- (vii) The draft Constitution emerging from Parliament shall be gazette before the holding of a referendum;
- (viii) A referendum on the new draft Constitution shall be held within 3 months of the conclusion of the debate;

- (ix) In the event of the draft Constitution being approved in the referendum it shall be gazette within 1 month of the date of the referendum; and
- (x) The draft Constitution shall be introduced in Parliament no later than 1 month after the expiration of the period of 30 days from the date of its gazetting.

Regrettably, the completion of this process took longer than anticipated for reasons that will be elaborately explained in the overall National Report, save to say that the lack of adequate and timeous funding were major issues, as well as the need to ensure that all stakeholders are extensively consulted at every stage of the process. It is important at this stage to state clearly that whilst this brief, which is about the National Statistical Report seeks to give the statistical details of the outcome of the outreach process, the National Report referred to above will extensively cover the whole process, and will specifically incorporate the following activities:

- a. The convening and outcomes of the first All Stakeholders Conference in 2009.
- b. The establishment of the Select Committee secretariat, as well as the training of outreach teams in December 2009 and January 2010.
- c. The training of Rapporteurs in April 2010.
- d. The nationwide outreach programme between June and October 2010.
- e. The Data uploading process between January and February 2011.
- f. The holding of Thematic Committee meetings between April and May 2011.
- g. The Report writing process between July and September 2011.
- h. The data and process auditing exercise in October 2011.
- i. The preparatory work for drafting in November 2011.
- j. The drafting process between December 2011 and March 2012.
- k. The second All Stakeholders Conference.
- I. The Report to Parliament.
- m. The Referendum process.

Readers of this National Statistical Report will be able to bear witness to the tremendous work the Select Committee has put into the process. Equally, this National Statistical report will show the sheer determination of the Select Committee to give effect to what the people said during outreach. This report is a product of extensive discussions, and contain critical information that can be used for future national development processes. The meticulous process from the preparation of the ward to this National Statistical Report bears testimony to the wonderful work of the Select Committee, and will forever remain one of the most ingenious processes ever under taken in this country at a critical juncture in our political discourse.

Brief overview of the outreach process

COPAC embarked on an outreach consultative programme to collect the peoples' views to form the constitution. The process took 105 days to complete against the budgeted 65 days due to the need to ensure the majority of the people participated as some of the meetings were cancelled due to non attendance by the people as a result of lack of adequate information on venues and starting times.

Seventy teams were set up comprising of representatives of the three main political parties civic society and other political parties to ensure the inclusive and democratic nature of the process pursuant to the requirements of article VI of the GPA.

Generally the public hearings were held in a peaceful environment, save for some cases of violence which resulted in some meetings, especially in Harare being abandoned. A rerun for those aborted meetings was however successfully undertaken. A total of 4821 public meetings were held in 1950 wards nationwide. Thematic based questions were asked using a standard guide in the form of the 17 thematic areas produced at the first all Stakeholders conference thereafter generally referred to as the 26 Talking Points. The Talking points comprised of questions which required listing and those which required scoring. At these public meetings participation was voluntary and all the responses were recorded in written and electronic formats. These responses formed the basis of this statistical analysis.

In the rural areas at least three public meetings were held per ward while in the urban areas, there were generally no more than one meeting in each ward. During data analysis, two views emerged, with one view suggesting the use of a meeting as the unit of measurement and another suggesting the use of the ward. Following extensive discussions, the Select Committee resolved to use the ward as the unit of measurement rather than the meeting since this would have given an unfair advantage to areas which had more meetings than others. The Select Committee agreed to collapse all outcomes of ward based meetings into a ward view. On questions which required scoring (generally referred to as the quantitative approach) the most frequently mentioned response was recorded as the ward view. On questions that required listing (generally referred to as the qualitative approach), all the views were listed. The Select Committee resolved that both the quantitative as well as the qualitative approaches were to be used in determining the importance of an issue raised during meetings.

Data Analysis

Statistics from outreach were consolidated into a database for use during the extraction of the Ward, District, Provincial and National Statistical reports. For questions which required listing the number of wards in which an issue was mentioned out of 1950 wards was expressed as a percentage. For questions which required scoring the relative proportions in which the issues

were mentioned in the various wards were expressed as a percentage giving a total of 100 percent.

Interpretation of Statistics

The percentages generated in the statistical reports are based on the number of wards in which an issue was mentioned out of the total number of wards. It therefore gives a general indication of the views which came out of the public consultative process. Given the fact that this was not a scientific study, the Select Committee resolved that both the statistics (quantitative) and the qualitative aspects of the outcomes (for example meeting atmosphere and others) must be taken into account in deciding what would eventually go into the constitution. The interpretation of these statistics therefore has to take into account these limitations in the methodology used. Whilst a high frequency was a general guide that in itself was not the sole determinant of the importance of an issue enough to find its way into the Draft Constitution that has been produced. It is for this reason that the Select Committee adopted two versions of interpreting the final data: the National Statistical Report (version 1), which aggregates the outcomes in each ward and expresses that as a percentage of all the wards in the country, and the Provincial Statistical Reports, which basically indicate how an issue faired per each province without subjecting it to the outcomes of other provinces.

This **Version 1** gives the national preponderance of an issue without considering the 'software side issues' which the Provincial Statistical Reports seek to illuminate. Where an issue for example enjoyed 100 percent frequency in each of five provinces and an average of 5 percent in each of the other five provinces in the country, the national preponderance would favour the outcomes in the five provinces that recorded 100 per cent frequency as reflecting generally what the country is saying on the issue. The Provincial Statistical Reports approach **(version 2)** would however seek to understand why the issue received such varied acceptance across the country. The tendency of the Select Committee on such issues was to therefore come up with a middle of the road position where applicable, in order to give effect to the diverse view points which emerged, rather than taking the absolute percentage in toto as advanced by version 1 approach, notwithstanding the fact that this version 1 approach **was an acceptable general guide**, and most issues with high frequencies found their way into the Draft Constitution.

Drafting Process

The drafting process commenced with extraction of constitutional issues by a team of technical experts drawn from the 3 main political parties and representatives from the Chief's Council. These issues were drawn from the consultative meetings, Members of Parliament ,the website submissions, children's outreach and other sectoral submissions.

Thereafter a process was undertaken to determine which Constitutional issues should go into the Constitution, and the approaches highlighted above were extensively used in this determination

Following the realization that there were some gaps in the information collected and that the type of questions asked during the consultative process answered the "what" component but did not address the "how" aspect, a team of local technical experts was mandated to identify the gaps in the information and research on how the gaps could be filled as well as research on best practices on implementation. The Gap filling process was done to bring into effect what the people had said.

The 'Agreed Issues Document', the 'Gap Filling Document', the 'Constitutional Principles' and the 'Draft Framework' formed the basic instructions given to the Drafters. All these documents were derived from the National and Provincial Statistical Reports (version 1 and 2), and because these documents were a product of extensive discussion and analysis, the Select Committee resolved that the drafters could not use the National and Provincial Statistical Reports as these would further confuse drafters and probably result in undermining what the Select Committee would have agreed to.

Note

The views of Zimbabweans in the diaspora, website submissions, views of Members of Parliament, Children, the Disabled and sectorial submissions are contained in separate reports to be incorporated into the final National Report, suffice to say that the views as expressed by these groups have already been taken into account in the Draft Constitution.

Conclusion

The Select Committee wishes to thank Zimbabweans for contributing extensively during the outreach meetings, and for being patient with COPAC in its trying times. You have remained calm in the face of attempts to stir up emotions, and have patiently waited for this moment in the country's history. The Draft Constitution produced, with the assistance of the negotiators to the GPA in unlocking some sticky issues, is still a draft, and the people of Zimbabwe have an opportunity to further interrogate the Draft between at the second All Stakeholders Conference. We urge Zimbabweans to have a national outlook in the conversations that follow, and to shun divisive tendencies and politics of hatred. It is our Constitution, it is our moment, and it is our heritage.

Agreement on Methodology



ensuring a people-driven constitution

Agreement

Whereas,on the 12th of May 2011, the Ad hoc Committee of the Select Committee agreed on the methodology to be used in the compilation of the Ward, District, Provincial and National Thematic reports.

Whereas, the Select Committee meeting of the 13th of May 2011 ratified and adopted the agreement.

Whereas, pursuant to the agreement, disagreements arose regarding implementation and interpretation of the agreement as related to the compilation of the District, Provincial and National Reports.

And whereas, the Management Committee called upon the Three Co Chairpersons to formulate an agreement to resolve this impasse.

NOW THEREFORE THE PARTIES AGREE AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. That effect should be given to the resolution of the Ad hoc Committee as ratified and adopted by the Select Committee on the 13th of May 2011.
- 2. For the avoidance of any doubt it is hereby recorded that both the qualitative and quantitative approaches are going to be used in the compilation of the District, Provincial and National Thematic Committee Reports.
- 3. Where it becomes necessary to ascertain views on the basis of their superior frequencies those views enjoying superior frequencies shall be clearly marked while those having inferior frequencies shall also be marked separately.
- 4. In respect of questions requiring scoring, the preponderance of views shall be based on the cumulative frequencies of those views. The number of meetings per ward shall be the denominator of the frequency fraction. For example, if there are 8 meetings the frequency denominator shall be 8. Where there are 7 meetings the frequency denominator shall be 7 [eg.4/8 and 4/7 respectively]
- 5. In respect of questions requiring listing, the following shall apply:
 - i. All responses shall be captured.

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ii. The frequency of the issues raised at each ward meeting shall be recorded.

There were other views such as people power-leaders accountable to people, recognition of national holidays (events), patriotism to the country, no racism, tribalism, oppression, national prosperity, development and food security.

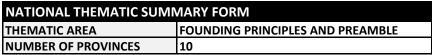

2. Arms of state

Version 1

National Narrative Report

Views expressed with regards to arms of state were that there should be: an Executive President with two Deputies, President and Prime Minister and or Prime Minister only.

It was stated that there should be separation of powers of the Executives, Judiciary and Legislature, where President would be the Head of state, whilst the Prime Minister is the Head of Government. The need to have a Ceremonial President, Prime Minister and Cabinet was also raised, other views indicating that the status quo be maintained.

On leadership type the views expressed were that there should be a President only, a Prime Minister only, both President and Prime Minister assuming office through a general election.

Opinions were expressed that the President should be sworn in by the Chief Justice, that the President be installed by the Traditional system whilst the Prime Minister should come from the party with the majority in Parliament. The view also expressed that the Prime Minister should be appointed by the President.

Further views were articulated on the need for Ministers to be M.Ps and also that Ministers could be appointed without first being M.Ps.

The suggestions on the responsibilities of ministerial appointments ranged from the President, Parliament, on the basis of merit, or through elections.

The need for a commission and a Quota system based on regions was also raised when appointing ministers.

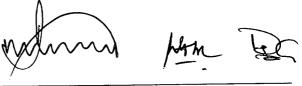
There were views that there should be two Houses of Parliament. There were also suggestions of one, three, four, five, six, and or more than six Houses of Assembly.

There were views that there should be seats reserved for women, traditional leaders, disabled as well as special interest groups, while there were also views that there should be no seats reserved for special groups, still views were also expressed that some groups could have reserved seats.

Contributors expressed the need for a court system that is organised by the President, Parliament and Judiciary Service Commission with some suggesting that the status quo be maintained.

Contributions with regards to the organisation of the court system were that the courts be organised as they are presently structured, that there must be an addition of a Constitutional Court to the current structure of the courts.

SYSTEM OF GOVERNMENT

At a national level, the systems of government that were suggested were Unitary, Devolved and Federal.

PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT

Some people said yes to Provincial Governments whilst others said no

HOW THEY SHOULD BE CONSTITUTED?

A) TYPE OF GOVERNMENT

On how they should be constituted in terms of the type of government the following views emerged" maintenance of status quo, as Provincial Councils, as Elected Provincial Councils, as Provincial Governments, as Provincial Parliaments, by elected Governors who have Provincial Councils as a Provincial Council headed by Governors appointed by the President and lastly as a Provincial Assembly reporting to central government

B) APPOINTMENT

On appointment, they said these should be appointed by: President, Parliament, President in consultation with Parliament, Governor appointed by Executive President in consultation with Prime Minister, political party with majority seats in Parliament, Governor's selected by 2/3rds majority in Parliament and that the Governor should come from the party with majority seats in the Province

C) ELECTIONS

They suggested that these be elected by the electorate, by proportional representation and by an Electoral College of members of the National Assembly from that Province

D) COMPOSITION

The composition showed that they wanted it to start from Traditional Leaders, Councillors/MPs/Provincial Administrators/Governors, Provincial Governors/Premiers, Devolved structures/Decentralise government offices, to be built from wards, to have a Governor and the Board, to get governors from elected MPs and Senators, must be led by the Provincial Administrator without a Governor, there should be governors who are MPs and to have Provincial Parliament with proportional seats for youth, men, women and all interest groups

E) TENURE

On tenure, they suggested the following: one 5 year term and that the Provincial Governor should serve two 5 year terms up to a maximum of 10 years.

QUALIFICATIONS

They said that all governors must come from the area

LOCAL GOVERNMENTS

Some said yes to local Governments whilst others said no to them.

HOW THEY SHOULD BE CONSTITUTED?

A) TYPE OF GOVERNMENT

On type of government some called for the maintenance of the status quo, that a local government institution should govern the affairs of its community subject to national and provincial governments, that there be a Commission led by Senators and MPs and lastly that this be headed by Executive Commissions

B) APPOINTMENT

In terms of appointment the views were: some must be appointed, the Mayor to be elected and in turn appoint an Executive Commission, there be Presidential appointment for urban officials and by elections to be held in rural areas, DAs to be appointed on merit by Public Services Commission, Town Clerks to be nominated by Councillors on contractual basis, to be appointed by Parliament Town clerk to be appointed by the Mayor and that there be an elected DA who should appoint a Local Board. However, others said there should not be any appointments.

C) ELECTIONS

The suggestions were that local government officials must be voted for, there should be Elected Councillors, the Mayor to be elected there be provision for Mayors with executive powers, they be elected by the people and have the necessary qualifications/competence/potential capacity, that traditional leaders should not be voted for and that there be an elected DA.

D) COMPOSITION

In terms of composition of local governments, they suggested that there be traditional leaders, Ceremonial Mayors, Mayors and Councillors and District Administrators who are professionals. However, others said there should be Chiefs on top, followed by Councillors, followed by Headmen then Village Heads, War Veterans & War Collaborators. Yet others suggested that Rural Councils should be headed by Chairpersons whilst some said these must be from local residents

E) QUALIFICATION

They said that in terms of qualifications, these officials must have the Necessary qualifications /competence/potential capacity, must reside in their respective constituencies and that councillors must be property owners

F) TENURE

M/c GOP

On tenure, they said these officials must be voted for after every 5 years and that councillors/mayors should serve two 5 year terms up to a maximum of 10 years.

G) GOVERNING LEGISLATION

They suggested that on legislation they should enact by-laws that protect, conserve and preserve the environment and that an Act of Parliament be there to provide for the establishment and powers of the local government institution, including by-laws and regulations and levy rates and taxes

FUNCTIONS OF PROVINCIAL AND LOCAL GOVERNMENTS

A) POLICY FORMULATION

Responses on policy formulation under the concept of functions of provincial and local governments were as such: enact and enforce by-laws, maintain the status quo, formulate policies that raise revenue in their areas, ensure good governance/democracy and that traditional should fight corruption.

B) DEVELOPMENT

They called for the following: traditional leaders must spearhead development (social, economic and infrastructural), social amenities, create employment, distribute empowerment funds and borrow funds for development areas

C) SOCIAL SERVICES

On social services they said this should include, service delivery, management of education, health and natural resources, food aid supply and the preservation and promotion of culture and local languages

D) REPRESENTATION

On representation, they said these must: address people's grievances/representation in central government, advise central government and that they should bring business of government closer to the people/ implement government policy

E) ADMINISTRATION

In terms of administration they said that Provincial Governments must craft their own budgets/taxation powers and do revenue collection, deal with all governance issues, monitor NGOs, provide national registration documents, ensure natural resources benefit their communities distribute land, have a provincial budget that is distributed equally and that they must not be partisan.

Additionally, there were suggestions that the Governor should head and coordinate development projects, be given adequate resources to run their constituencies, that there be equal distribution of resources between men and women, empower their areas and that provinces should oversee district operations. In the end they said that districts must control their own affairs, that there should be a devolved system of government at local level and reduction of rural to urban migration

DETERMINATION OF PROVINCES

A) NAMING

In terms of province determination by naming, some said the status quo should be maintained whilst others suggested the following: Manicaland, Mashonaland, Matabeleland, Midlands, Masvingo, provinces, Not to be named on tribal grounds, Matabeleland, Manicaland and Mashonaland, Mashonaland West, Matabeleland North, Matabeleland South, Masvingo, Manicaland, Mashonaland East, Midlands, Mashonaland West, Manicaland, Mashonaland, Matabeleland, Midlands, Masvingo plus one, that the provinces should be named after historical monuments and natural resources in the areas and that Masvingo should be divided into two Shangani and Karanga

B) GEOGRAPHICAL & GEO-POLITICAL

On province determination according to geography and geopolitical considerations, they said that these should include the following: population density, cardinal points (North, East, West, South), natural regions, North, East, West, South and Central, number of districts. natural resources, by using constituencies, by council area, according to capital assets, nautical points and that 5 to 6 districts should make up a province

C) POPULATION/ETHNICITY

In terms of province determination by population and ethnicity, they suggested the following: according to distances from service centres, according to local languages and cultural values,, on tribal grounds, along traditional clans/ethnic regions, according to large cities, according to traditional leadership, through chiefs' determination and that there be created a province for the Tonga people

D) BY DECREE

In terms of province determination by decree, respondents suggested that provinces be determined by the President, Parliament, the Delimitation Commission, Electoral Commission to determine, the people through voting, the President and the Prime Minister, 5 provinces demarcated by Parliament, 10 provinces determined by Head of State and that for purposes of devolution, the boundaries and capitals of these provinces be as prescribed in a schedule of this constitution

E) STATUS QUO

Those who called for status quo maintenance suggested that the provinces remain as they are currently delimitated whilst others said they should be as they were before inclusive government

There were also instances where there were no responses while other responses were for maintenance of the current status quo. Views were also that these public officers should be non-partisan.

PROVISIONS FOR THE OFFICE OF ATTORNEY GENERAL

Specific provisions for the office of the Attorney General were that the appointment should be by the President, Parliament, and Judicial commission, by the Prime Minister, on merit, by the Cabinet, the Senate, and President in consultation with the Prime Minister, President in consultation with the Parliament and President in consultation with the Judicial Services. There were further views that they must be non-partisan while in some instances there were no responses on the subject. Other views were for maintenance of the status quo.

The views expressed with regards to the functions of the Attorney General were that He/She is the Legal Advisor to the Government, Chief Prosecutor, Member of Parliament, sits in cabinet and should be impartial and non-partisan. Other views were that there should be maintenance of the status quo while in some instances there were no responses.

On the question of whether the Attorney General should also be a legal Advisor to Government as well as being the national Prosecutor there were views that he can be both and also views that he should not .Others called for maintenance of the status quo while in some instances there were no responses given.

NATIONAL NARRATIVE REPORT: LANGUAGES, ARTS AND CULTURE

VERSION 1

Languages

The views that were expressed nationally regarding the question of languages included that all languages should be officialised, Braille and sign language be taught and promoted, Local languages should be considered in employment qualification, There should be equality and non-discrimination amongst languages, Media should use local languages, Status of English must be diminished, The English language should be the international language for Zimbabwe, Schools must teach local languages, All local languages should be respected, promoted and recognized, All indigenous languages must be termed national languages, International languages must be officialised, Official languages must be made compulsory.

Local languages should be used as medium of instruction and in technology, There should be commemoration of a national day of languages, Citizens must have the right to use their language of choice, local languages should be used in courts and parliament, all local languages must be preserved, Civil servants should be able to speak the languages which are dominant in their area of deployment, Children should be taught at least two local languages and that the history of local languages must be documented.

Other views which were expressed in this thematic area included those such as that: The media must use local languages equally, That English should not be set as a pre-requisite for furthering education, That a language policy must be crafted, promotion and tolerance for multilingualism,

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English to be assigned the same status as local languages and that there must be public translators.

A language regulatory board would have to be set up, An Act of parliament should specify the functions of all languages, that the following languages be declared equal Zimbabwean languages; Ndebele, Shona, Kalanga, Nabya, Chikunda, Venda, Xangani, Chewa, Nyanja, Sotho, Tonga, Xhosa, Pfumbi, Hwesa, Chewa, Barwe, Tshawo, Doma, English and Sign language and that the constitution must adopt a three tier language policy in education or a two tier system.

Arts

The views expressed in relation to the question of the arts included views that; The constitution should seek to promote, protect and preserve local arts and craft, There should be a Ministry dedicated to arts, There should be prevention of piracy, Censorship of films and music, Establishment of national commission boards and centers, promotion and empowerment of local artists and establish art galleries, There should be freedom of artistic expression and operation and active teaching of the arts in school. There must be development of the arts industry, No promotion of foreign music and culture and outstanding artists must be accorded hero status, Nurture and promote talent as well as patenting of intellectual right s to be mandatory.

It was further opinioned that a fund must be established to amongst other things assist disabled artists, Commission an anti-piracy body, media to promote and publicize the arts and not be censored and that national monuments should be protected.

Culture

The views on the issue of culture were that: Culture should be respected and promoted, Promote decent dress and be accommodative but not to allow pornography and homosexuality to be a part of culture, Women to have a national dress, Minister of culture to a black citizen, While some contributors wanted polygamy to be permitted others opposed this view.

No man should be allowed to plait their hair, Abortion should not be legal, Youths must be tested for virginity status, Sacred places and shrines should be protected, A witchcraft Act should be enacted, marriage must only be allowed for mature citizens i.e. those having attained the ages of between 18 and 25 years, Traditional healers to be recognized and registered, Abolishing of prostitution, No explicit sex material should be allowed, There must be no forced marriages or inheritance of wives, circumcision must be promoted while village heads must assume office through an election process. Contraceptives and birth control must be banned, Those cultures which give surnames of mothers to children must be permitted, Prominent African icons like King Mzilikazi and Mbuya Nehanda must be celebrated and commemorated, Traditional leaders must have a national dress and marriage must be as per tradition and marijuana must be legalized.

It was also stated that there must be a prohibition to the use of the girl child as payment to appease avenging spirits and that surviving spouse and or children should inherit property of deceased parent.

TRADITIONAL INSTITUTIONS

VERSION 1

The national views that emerged on the Traditional Institution thematic area were varied on all the concepts viz: Recognition, Protection and Continuation of Traditional Leaders, Method of Selection and Appointment, Functions, Duties and Responsibilities, Relations with Government/Parliament, Welfare of Traditional Leaders, Political Participation and lastly Regalia of Traditional Leaders.

Recognition Protection and Continuation of Traditional Leaders

On this concept, the following views were suggested: They demanded that the traditional leaders be respected, that their power and authority be increased, traditional leaders should be in the constitution, traditional culture to be restored, maintain status quo and that they be called kings. Others said that their court systems must be recognised and respected and that they should work with spirit mediums. However, others called for the phasing out of chiefs but others called for the revival of the Ndebele Kingdom. There was a demand for traditional laws to be written, abolishing of colonial names like mambo and that there should be a king above chiefs. They said that chiefs should be allowed to slaughter game animals during functions and given status when they die. Lastly, they suggested that there should be a ministry of kings and war veterans.

METHOD OF SELECTION/APPOINTMENT

On method of selection and appointment the following views emerged: installation to be done according to traditional practices, they should be appointed according to lineage and on tribal and clan and not by ministers, be sworn in by spirit mediums, must be trained by the judiciary and educated to a minimum education standard, not to be voted for, (whilst others said they should be voted for), no politics on installation of traditional leaders and that women should be appointed as traditional leaders. They also suggested that headmen should be chosen by chiefs not by political parties, those demoted during colonial era to be reinstated but said no to female chiefs. Furthermore, they were of the view that Installation should be done at the 30/35 years age level, that chiefs must install other chiefs, no to corruption in chieftainship appointments and no to inheritance.

Others called for Ministers and government to inaugurate the traditional leaders, DAs and local government to appoint leaders, village heads and headman to have a 10 year limit in office and that people should be able to remove traditional leaders who do not perform and who are corrupt. Calling for an increase in the number of chiefs there were national calls for traditional leaders to be chosen by the President whilst others said that all chieftainships should be rotated with some suggesting that they should relinquish power after turning 75 years old. Finally, they suggested that the president should have the right to appoint chiefs that there should be a fixed term of office for chiefs but that there should be no court of appeal in the appointment of chiefs.

FUNCTIONS, DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES

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Nationally, various views emerged on the above concept and these included: preservation of culture, tradition, history and heritage, traditional leaders' judicial powers over communal cases, land distribution, management of natural resources, fair treatment of subjects, they be custodians of sacred shrines, enforcement of traditional and customary laws and that they should stick to their jurisdiction. They said that they should not be corrupt when trying cases but be empowered to represent the people. Other views to emerge were as follows:: enforce environmental laws, that they do the will of the people, intervene in disputes, act as marriage officers, be law abiding, have autonomous administrative powers, perform ritual functions and that they should have a code of conduct for chiefs to guard against them disappointing the people. Some suggested that traditional leaders must not be Christian.

They called for reasonable fines to their subjects, registration of traditional healers and that their judgement should be final. They also suggested the following: traditional leaders should preside over family related cases but never criminal cases, observe human rights, spearhead development, ensure people dress decently, consult subjects, not to sell land, be given power to prosecute witches, rule without intimidation and independently, have the right to discipline, rule independently, existence of a clear job description for chiefs, Sabhuku's and Mlisa, chiefs to swear in the President, ensure that natural resources benefit local people, be given land to promote Isiphala seNkosi, keep lost livestock and no to the existence of Zunde Ramambo. In addition, they suggested that: they be given the power to issue burial orders and birth certificates, perform corporal punishment but that their judgement should be reviewed by the Magistrates. They said that traditional leaders should safeguard the country's interest, be custodians but not administrators of land and law, vet people coming in their areas, consult communities on decision making, have judicial powers but retain administrative powers, advise on settlement issues and matrimonial rights but should not sentence any one to death and instead let legislation guide their work.

Also, they suggested the following: traditional leaders should be commissioners of oath, reside in rural areas, not fine people for burials, be stripped of some of their power, have the right to dismiss a Sabhuku who fails to deliver, have power to clear livestock on sale and hand down stiff penalties for relatives who rape minors, assist disadvantaged people, return to their original land and that they must always be available for the people and ensure that no religion prohibits medical, hospital treatment. Other views were that Kraal heads should not pass sentences, traditional leaders to help rid communities of false prophets, abolish pornography and beauty pageants, head the Ministry of culture and finally they should uphold criminalisation of abortion.

RELATIONS WITH GOVERNMENT/ PARLIAMENT

The national views on the concept of the traditional leaders' relations with government included the following: the right to parliamentary representation, creation of an independent chiefs' council in parliament, that traditional leaders should be above the DA, have direct access to the president that there should be a commission for chiefs and that there should not be any parliamentary intervention in their affairs. Additionally, they called on the traditional leaders to support the government of the day but not to sit in parliament. Others said they should be under state authority but be included in provincial and local governments whilst they should chair rural councils which should be under them. Some said MPs must work in liaison with chiefs whilst they and councillors must report to chiefs.

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In addition, they suggested that traditional leaders must be involved in community development programmes but they should have Government constructed courts. Nationally they suggested that they should respect legislation and constitution and councillors should not interfere with the roles of traditional leaders. Other suggestions on this were: traditional leaders should have the status of Ministers, that they be higher than President and elected leadership and that the Witchcraft Suppression Act should be removed. They said that traditional leaders should be accountable to the DA and have a central office. Finally there was a view that there should not be a commission for them.

WELFARE OF TRADITIONAL LEADERS

On the above concept, the national views reflected the need for the following: traditional leaders should be paid remuneration by the state, given vehicles, have the right to accommodation and decent lives and that they must be rewarded well. Others said there must be community administration, benefits of chiefs should cascade to kraal heads and headmen and that traditional leaders must have a ministry to look into their welfare. Some suggested that chiefs' wives should have official cars but that they should not be paid by the community although there must be free education for their children whilst protection should be accorded for their families.

POLITICAL PARTICIPATION

In terms of political participation, some views suggested that traditional leaders must be apolitical and non-partisan. However, others demanded that they must have the right to political affiliation whilst others said they must be exempted from voting

REGALIA OF TRADITIONAL LEADERS

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Nationally there were suggestions that traditional leaders must wear gold bracelets, gold medals and gold badges but not red clothes. The demanded that they must be dressed traditionally with village heads getting uniforms. Lastly, others suggested that the traditional leaders must be given crowns

NATIONAL NARRATIVE REPORT

TRANSITIONAL MECHANISMS

With regards to transitional mechanisms the views expressed were that the hand over take over should be immediately, three months,24 hours,2 days ,one month, three days ,7 days ,2 months ,5 days, two weeks ,6 months,21 days,5 months, 4-6 months ,one year, 4 days , adequate ,14-30 days,1-2 years ,10-15 years,10 days ,nine months ,40days,ten months and until the end of the term. There were calls that the hand over take over period be characterised by smooth, peaceful and transparent conditions .It was also suggested that it should it should be a public handover take over and that there should be respect of the handover take over.

In the event of incapacitation of the President views were that the office of President can be held by the Vice President, the Chief Justice, The Speaker of Parliament, a Transitional Authority, Electoral Commission, SADC/AU/UN, Soldiers /Army a Supreme Court Judge, Appointed by Parliament, International Observers Church Leaders, Army General, and Attorney General until end of the term, two weeks, one day, immediately.

Other views expressed were that transitional authority during election period should rest with the Chief Justice, Vice President, President, an independent body, Speaker of Parliament ,Prime Minister, Electoral Commission ,Attorney General, SADC ,AU,UN, the Army, a Supreme Court Judge ,Electoral Commission ,Church leaders ,appointed by Parliament ,International Observers, Army General and a Transitional Authority while others expressed that the current status quos be maintained .

The term of office of the President was suggested to be a maximum of two five year terms, one five year term, a unlimited term, a four year term, a maximum of two

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seven year term ,not more than 15 years, a maximum of one three year term and that Parliament should decide .

With regards to the release of election results the views were that it should be within 1day,2 days, unspecified ,immediately, one week, 3 months, ,five days, three days, one month,,timely,36 hours and that it can be unlimited .

Views on the Presidential age were that it should be between 40 -70, forty and above between 40-60, between 35-65, between 40-65, 45 and above ,65 and 40 and below The Presidential age limit was suggested to be 70 years, not more than 80, unlimited, 100 years and 65 years.

On who swears in the president views were that it should be the Chief Justice, Traditional leaders, Judiciary, the Attorney General and the electoral Commission.

The views on transition to a new constitution were that it should be immediately and that there should be a stipulated day for elections and inauguration .Other views were that the winning President should have 51% while others expressed that they should get 75% of the vote and that elections be held in a free and fair environment while there should be provisions for impeachment of the President.

Further views were that aliens should not be allowed to vote while there were also views that the United Nations (UN) should observe elections and Provide Security. There were also views that there should be no voters roles but use of National identity cards and that there should be a board to oversee the Transition at the same ensuring that the police and the militia is not actively involved.

There were other views that there should be no re-elections, the diaspora be allowed vote, there be no electoral votes while other view were that they should be allowed. There were also views that the President should have liberation war credentials and that there be a culture of accepting election results and adherence to election dates

10 YOUTH THEMATIC-NATIONAL NARRATIVE REPORT:

The age ranges expressed regarding the ages of the youth are as follows: 15-35; 16-35; 18-30; 15-36; 16-30. However, these and some other; age ranges expressed are shown in the table below

The rights of the youths are inter alia: Right to Education; Free primary and Tertiary education; Right to maternity; Right to equal education opportunity; Adult Education; Vocational Skills Training; Economic Empowerment; Access to bank loans without collateral security; Right to bank loans and Natural Resources; Right to access land; Right to own land; Right to farming inputs; Protection from all forms of abuse; Right to healthcare; Freedom of Association and Expression; Right to national Identity; Right to information; Talent Promotion; Birth certificate; Right to political participation; Right to a Passport; Right to a registration Document; Right to life; Freedom of worship; Right to vote and be voted for; Right to vote at 18; Right to voter registration; Right to food; Right to property and its ownership; Right to employment and employment opportunities and Right to quota system in all decision making bodies.

It was suggested that the youth must attend National Youth Service. People's views are that it should be compulsory; voluntary; Non-partisan with some rising that there must be no national youth service. Other views suggested that National Youth Service be a prerequisite

The provinces also expressed views such as the National Youth Council; Independent Youth Council; National Youth Commission and Independent Youth Commission. It was further expressed that the youth should be taught history and culture in schools in order to respect elders and have a descent Dress code;

NATIONAL NARRATIVE REPORT: WOMEN & GENDER

VERSION 1

Regarding the subject of women and gender, the following views were expressed. Women should occupy public offices including the presidium. They require a 50/50 involvement in all governance matters including equal decision making within traditional leadership and other arms of state.

Women want to be self represented in parliament. One third parliamentary representation was mentioned. There was also the view that there should be equal contestation for posts rather than adopt a quota system. A quota system was seen to affect both sexes adversely by some people. Thus some felt there should be no reserved parliamentary seats for women.

It was mentioned that women have the right to vote and that they should be elected on merit to positions of authority. It was also mentioned that they have the right to choose a political party of their choice and should not be abused and manipulated politically. Titles are expected to be gender sensitive.

The idea of a specific budget for women, the domestication of all international protocols and a voting age were mentioned. It was also said that women should not be raped during elections. Political violence was condemned. Everyone is expected to be equal before the law. Some felt that equality should only be outside the home environment.

Some suggested that women should be appointed as traditional leaders(chiefs and headmen). It was mentioned that women have the right to land, natural resources, empowerment, mines, loans without collateral/conditions, wealth, property, life pensions, start big business(not selling tomatoes), title to land, sell anywhere, fully paid maternity leave, matrimonial land, easy access to markets, no loss of paid maternity, insurance at work, 50% stake in economy, means of production, exempted from taxation and receive pension of their deceased husbands.

It was stated that there should be equal pay for equal work and equal employment opportunities. Discrimination against women at work was discouraged. Equality at work place was called for and no sexual harassment/abuse at work. There was a call for a transparent exploitation of resources.

It was mentioned that women should have 99 year lease for land and they should be pensioned at 60 years. Housewives should be paid and have pension while widows and orphans should have land. It was suggested that women should get farms after Advanced level. Some felt women should not have property rights. People mentioned that there should be skills development for women and they should also engage in cross border trading. It was said property should be shared after divorce.

The following views were very common: Free access to family planning pills, abortion was condemned, maternal care and delivery should be free, male midwives and gynaecologists are not preferred, Sanitary pads should be free, infanticide should be punished. Other free services should include health care, public transport during pregnancy and ARVs. Sanitary pads should be provided in prison. However there are people who are in favour of abortion.

Some people felt that maternity leave should be unlimited, while others suggested that it should be 3, 6,7,8, 9, 10-12 months or 2 years. There were others who suggested that there should be paternity leave without a specific time frame given. There were views that family planning should not be controlled. There was the view that women should be remunerated while on maternity leave. There was also the view that pregnant girls should not be expelled from school and that pregnant women should have special treatment in public transport. Breast feeding mothers should have ample time to breast feed.

Educational equality was called for in schools and free primary education for women. In the case of pregnancy in school, both parties should be punished. The idea of appeasing Ngozi with girl child was strongly discouraged, and so was the habit of forced marriage and domestic violence against women. Mutual respect between sexes was stressed.

Widows who re-marry should have their right to property revoked. Overally there was a call for respect of gender roles. Incest should be outlawed. Marital rape was discouraged. People want to see rape sentences being more harsh than the current state. Women have the right to say no to sex. The practice of polygamy/bigamy was discouraged. A national dress code was suggested and that there should be the right to choose dressing.

And I

There were people who believe that women should submit to men. Men who impregnate women are expected to take responsibility by marrying them. Children born out of wedlock should be well looked after. Divorce laws are expected to favour women. Those who transmit HIV should be prosecuted.

There was a view that women should propose men. Some do not want women to wear trousers. There was divided opinion on customary marriage, with some urging for it to be legalised and others rejecting the practice. All traditional laws oppressive of women should be discarded. Pornography was rejected. Others called for the abolition of **lobola** and **nhaka**. The right to privacy was stressed. Some people want a gender commission for women. There was a suggestion that children should carry their mother's surname. Note that many of other issues mentioned were merely rights expressed in the bill of rights. This narrative summary is supported by the tables below.

12. Public Finance

The views raised under revenue collection are that revenue should be collected from the following sources: taxes and duties; sale of minerals and other natural resources; tollgates; loans and borrowings; royalties and levies; farming and industries; tourism; donations; international trade/exports; dividends from state enterprises; as well as foreign direct investments. The other sources highlighted include fines; stock; land tax; interest from loans; exporting of ideas; the disposal of government shares; and rentals.

In terms of management of the consolidated fund the views are that the following should be responsible for management: RBZ; Ministry of Finance; that the status quo must prevail; that a central bank be established; that RBZ and the Ministry of Finance be given borrowing powers; that the Ministry of Finance and Governor be the regulating authority; and that a revenue authority be established.

For supervision and oversight the following views were raised: that supervision and oversight should rest with Parliament; the Ministry of Finance; RBZ; an independent commission; with the President; with a board of directors/ governors; the Auditor General; the Attorney General; Cabinet and Parliament and a committee appointed by the Executive President; and with the Government; the Prime Minister; the President and Cabinet; the Senate and that external borrowings should be authorised by Parliament. It was further suggested that supervision and oversight should be the responsibility of Chiefs; police and soldiers; Cabinet; and Provincial Governors.

In relation to budget formulation, the need for grassroots and stakeholder consultation was raised; that the Minister of Finance be responsible for the annual budget; that the status quo be maintained; that it should be prepared in consultation with Parliament; and that it be drawn up from provincial budgets to national budgets. In addition, it was suggested that the Ministry of Finance and a Commission be responsible for budget formulation; that there be no supplementary budget; that the budget is published in all languages; and that there should be no expenditure outside the budget.

In terms of the management of the budget, the views were that the budget should be used for the following: developmental projects; agriculture support; equitable distribution of resources; infrastructural development, social welfare; government expenditure; that revenue be ploughed back to its source; for civil servants salaries; empowerment projects; and that there should be equal distribution between ministries. Other uses were identified as equal distribution to provinces; allocation to ministries; service delivery; priority budget; that use must be apolitical;; drought relief; loans; that budget allocations should not be transferable across ministries; disaster relief; student grants; unemployment benefits; war veterans; food subsidies; payment of debts; for reviving industries; and a high allocation to productive sectors.

In relation to accountability and transparency the issues raised were that there should be an independent audit; that there should be transparency; the need for annual audited reports; that Auditor General be responsible for monitoring; that corrupt tendencies be prosecuted. In addition, the need for an independent commission was raised; that there be an Act of parliament; and political parties be responsible; and that government borrowing be approved by Parliament.

FG Page 134 of 54 The issues raised under monetary policy are: regulation of local currency; printing of money; controlling inflation; regulation of taxes and interest rates; that the money should have the face of the President and other heroes; regulation of foreign currency and maintaining the status quo.

The other functions of the RBZ were identified as local bank supervision; government banker; granting of loans; custodian of mineral reserves; quasi-fiscal activities; lender of last resort; promotion of economic development; advisor to government; protection of natural resources; presentation of the national budget and ensuring food security.

In terms of the appointment of the RBZ Governor the following were suggested: the President; Parliament; and that the appointment must be appolitical, that is should be on a 1x5 year term; based on qualification; on merit; that the status quo remains; on a 2x5 year basis; by a commission; by the Prime Minister, and by the Ministry of Finance.

It suggested that supervision and regulation the need for independence and autonomy was raised; that it be done by an independent commission; by Parliament; by the Ministry of Finance; and by governor; by an Independent Commission/Board; and by the President.

The need for an independent audit and publicizing government expenditure were raised as issues for enhancing accountability and transparency.

War Veterans



NATIONAL NARRATIVE REPORT: WAR VETERANS

VERSION 1

Definition

The issues that came out on the definition of war veterans include: an inclusive definition of liberation combatants, war collaborators and ex-detainees. These (excombatants, war collaborators and ex-detainees) should be treated equally. People also felt that parents who provided food should be included. They fall within the period between 1890-1980. There was also mention of fighters of democracy and victims of 27 June as qualifying war veterans.

Recognition, respect and honour

There were also views that war veterans, war collaborators and ex-detainees should be honoured, recognized and respected by all governments. War veterans should be accorded hero status and a day should be set aside to commemorate them. There should be heroes acres in provinces and those in foreign lands should be maintained. People mentioned the need for institutions to be named in honour of war veterans including memorial hospitals and commemorative medals.

Entitlements

There was also mention of entitlements for war veterans such as monthly pension, compensation of the groups that include ex-combatants, war collaborators, exdetainees and recruitees. People also felt the constitution should include social benefits for war veterans such as free education for them and their children, free health for their families, transport as well as decent burial/reburial. People also mentioned the need for a ministry to cater for war veterans while some felt the ministry of defense should be responsible. There was mention for the constitution to provide for benefits payment to families fallen war veterans.

Economic empowerment

Economic benefits should also be extended to war veterans such as land, economic empowerment, and access to input support and mechanization. There was also a view that there be a quota system in all economic sectors for war veterans. Some felt war veterans should be given loans while some felt such loans must be without collateral.

Political

It was also mentioned that war veterans should be allowed the opportunity to rule, appointed to ministerial position, involved in national programmes and access the president. Need for documentation/teaching of the history of armed struggled.

Concerns

It was stressed that war veterans should be non- partisan/apolitical. Some also felt war veterans should be vetted/re-vetted. It was mentioned that war veterans should promote peace and should not harass ordinary civilians to command respect. Some people felt war veterans must be given land not pension while others also felt the pension must be stopped and veterans to the barracks. The June 27 and Gukurahundi victims were also were mentioned for compensation.

Name Louville River Africa

Further views on Administration Zimbabweans expressed the following; land should be owned by Zimbabweans, equitable distribution of land, land audit, one man one farm policy, land commission, productive use of land, land should not be sold, no compensation, no multiple farms, agricultural support, traditional leaders to allocate land, land our heritage, no discrimination on land distribution, land to benefit locals, traditional leaders to preside over land, traditional leaders to be custodians of land, access to agricultural inputs, bankable leases, demarcate land as per land use patterns, consider productivity, access to loans, land must be conserved, youth to be given land, no to land taxes, local communities first, agricultural skills, women must be given land, compensation to be paid and conservation of land.

NATURAL RESOURCES

The views expressed with regards to Natural resources were that all natural resources and their proceeds belong to the state and they must be distributed equally. Traditional leaders must be given the power to control and monitor resources without foreign interference. The need for all minerals to be processed locally with accountability and transparency was also raised. The views indicated that small scale miners needed to be resourced and that Parliament appoints a Natural Resource Commission whilst those companies which will be extracting natural resources needed to pay royalties to the relevant authorities.

The views suggested that the government assist locals in marketing to ensure suitable use.

Their views indicated that natural resources should be processed locally and also benefit from the indigenisation and empowerment programme.

They acknowledged the need to preserve natural resources whilst developing local communities through infrastructure development from the proceeds of natural resources as well as the decentralisation of processing of processing zones for employment creation.

The views expressed with regards to legislation were the need to legislate and regulate in order to protect natural resources and their proceeds, affirmative action on licence acquisition for indigenous people and the registration of all natural resources whilst those who were relocated be treated fairly

VERSION ONE NATIONAL NARRATIVE REPORT

EMPOWERMENT

Under this theme, the views which the people wanted to be included in the constitution are shown below. They are classified under 13 concepts which act as sub headings.

1. GOVERNMENT ASSISTANCE

1

The people said that they want access to loans with or without collateral, farming inputs, capital for farmers, state to guarantee loans, loans for livestock production and have credit provision of agricultural inputs as well as establishment of provincial revolving funds. They added that there should be access to loans for civil servants, government should allocate land for business activities, encourage people to have some form of collateral to secure loans especially through title deeds. Land should be accepted as collateral with government buying shares on behalf of the black majority, create self-help projects for the youth and embark on programmes that must empower the poor and not corruptly benefit those already in position of power. Other views were that government needed to set up competitive agricultural markets without discrimination on political grounds.

Further submissions were that, people must be granted permits to market minerals, whilst government must consult grassroots on developmental issues, reduce taxes and allocate 5% to 10% of the budget to women and youth and ensure that A1 ad A2 farmers should get equal assistance from the government. They advocated for government to pay royalties to communities, to allow donor assistance, fund for small businesses, protect local farmers from foreign competition and help them have access to lines of credit. Donor assistance was to be allowed, royalties to be paid through government, ensure security of citizens, and give grants to take care of the aged including equitable agricultural support for all regions as well as granting aid to cooperatives.

2. INVESTMENT AND INFRASTRUCTURE DEVELOPMENT

The issues that were raised were that there should be development of infrastructure and social amenities in marginalised areas, provision for infrastructure and resources to people, empowerment of marginalised areas and

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rural infrastructure development. They said that farmers need transport to ferry their produce to the markets, need for equipment to be loaned to people at concessionary rates, irrigation and farm mechanisation be easily accessible including the right to equipment.

Water bodies such as dams and irrigation schemes, aided by provision of machinery, supervised by an independent empowerment board which ensures creation of viable markets for produce supported by provision of electrification, good road networks which holistically guarantees national industrial development strategy. There was need to craft a viable policy to promote investor confidence, driven by a sound levies based development strategy including establishment of state universities in every provinces.

Attention was then focused to the protection of wildlife, provision of local grazing areas and dip tanks aided by the promotion of alternative energy and building materials so as to preserve environment and its natural heritage. Effective communication was also cited as vital for effective networking.

3. EQUAL DISTRIBUTION OF RESOURCES

There were views to the effect that there should be transparency in the distribution of natural resources to ensure local resources benefit locals, advance community empowerment initiatives, projects to benefit all people e.g. the issuance of tractors, holistic material inputs. Empowerment should start with natural resources access to land for the disabled, women, war veterans and orphans who get assistance, access to capital for men and women, as well as introducing vocational training at ward level.

4. SKILLS TRAINING AND EDUCATION

On this concept, there was advocacy for ensuring skills training for empowerment, provision of free education, introduction of adult education, proffering of professional advice, building of vocational training colleges in rural areas, accessibility of quality education to all, empower disadvantaged provinces

and have deliberate equity polices. They wanted proceeds from sell of local resources to be used to educate local communities, skills training in farming, higher education for all districts, government to create self-help projects for the youth. They also wanted political and economic education for all, rights to technical education, establishment of a research board, education of employees, easy access to educational scholarships and give state sponsored skills training. As was before, they wanted education to be compulsory, that there be periodic research for identification of national empowerment needs, business development courses as well as educate citizens to speak local languages, constitution revive the department of veterinary and agricultural outreach programmes, teaching local languages in schools, capacity building programmes for loan recipients and see reintroduction of adult literacy classes. They wanted the teaching of human rights, and ensure that natural resources benefit inhabitants in areas which they live.

5. INDIGENISATION

On indigenisation aspect they said, the constitution should compel all arms of the state and everyone involved in the various business concerns raised in all the 14 concepts in this theme as shown in the statistical table on each relevant concept.

6. EMPOWER LOCAL COMMUNITIES

This was to be achieved through giving Resettled Farmers Title Deeds to Secure Loans, Local Communities to Be Given First Right of Refusal To The 51% Shareholding and the full Implementation of the Indigenous Act. They said they wanted the Empowerment of Local Communities through Ploughing Back Of Natural Resources which should be Processed Locally Using Local Labour for Health Services, Basic Commodities, Preferential Employment value addition. tenders, distribution of Infrastructure Of Locals, awarding of business Development nonpartisan Political Empowerment which should target those Inc Need and capable. Other projects talked about were the helping of locals restock, introduction of quarter system exemption from payment of levies and taxes, for retention of profits from sell of local resources and support of women in selfhelp empowerment projects.

7. AFFIRMATIVE ACTION

4

Affirmative action was necessary for women and youth empowerment through granting mineral rights, shares, empowerment scheme setting up exclusive bank for the marginalised and instates periodic audits to promote accountability of government project allocations. Targeted focus was needed on war veteran's families to enable them to have free access to education, localised offerings of mining business concerns including setting up an empowerment bank. Workers needed to always be accorded the right to first Preference shares in all company liquidations

8. ADMINISTRATION

Turning to the issue of skills training, education and development, respondents submitted that the Constitution should provide for free education at primary, vocational and tertiary education levels. Proceeds from the selling of local resources were to be used to educate local communities. They further submitted that all persons needed to have access to technical education and state to provide for vocational training colleges including in rural areas. Empowerment programmes should deliberately target previously disadvantaged communities and the state should take responsibility of equipping citizens with skills including education and farming.

Responding to the questions on the indigenisation concept, they said government should assist locals to acquire shares. Indigenisation must be apolitical and indigenisation of entities, exploiting local resources must benefit those local communities who should have majority ownership of foreign owned companies. Local communities must be given first right of refusal to the 51% shareholding under the indigenous Act and tenders for infrastructure development must be offered to locals first. Proceed from sell of natural

 resources must be channelled and ploughed back to local communities. All natural resources are to be processed locally using local labour. There should be preferential employment of locals and empowerment should target the needy. Emphasis was made on the need to prioritise previously marginalised communities on a targeted basis to compensate for the spells of deprivation.

The audience advocated for the adoption of firm affirmative action saying that the constitution should support women in project construction and procurement of shares in foreign companies. The constitution should provide for a bank for the marginalised and empowerment should target groups such as youths, women, War Veterans and marginalised groups. In terms of administration, there should be devolution of power to the provinces; projects should be managed by traditional leaders with Chiefs responsible for allocating land. 99 year leases are to be used as collateral to access loans. There should be clear demarcation of land use between animal's people. Essential services such as documents provision must be decentralised and power must be devolved to the provinces. Local public offices should be manned by people who speak local languages and deliberate policies to protect the environment from veld fires and poachers. Investors must assume social responsibilities and foreign companies must have black empowerment policies.

9. SOCIAL RESPONSIBILITY OF INVESTORS

A host of issues were raised which are self-explanatory. They are all laid o in the statistical tables and arranged in their hierarchical order. Since most of these issues are similar to those under administration concept, empowering of local communities the summaries in those concepts are adequate.

10. ECONOMIC

On the economic concept, low interest rates should be promoted and there should be equitable distribution of loans and land. The State should set up a development fund, reduce mine registration fees and avail markets. The State should promote investment and provide for employee ownership schemes and encourage partnership between locals and foreigners. They concluded by saying that State should ensure social empowerment by providing pensions to the elderly persons.

11. SOCIAL

The audience advocated for the adoption of firm affirmative action saying that the constitution should support women in project construction and procurement of shares in foreign companies. The constitution should provide for a bank for the marginalised and empowerment should target groups such as youths, women, War Veterans and marginalised groups. In terms of administration, there should be devolution of power to the provinces; projects should be managed by traditional leaders with Chiefs responsible for allocating land. 99 year leases are to be used as collateral to access loans. 12. INHERITANCE LAWS / PROPERTY RIGHTS

The people said there should be no empowerment by taking other people's property but government must enact by-laws that promote indigenous people through creation of jobs and equal employment opportunities.

13. ADDITIONAL ISSUES

The additional issues that were braised by the people which must be put in the new constitution comprise the need for socio-economic empowerment of groups such as HIV/ AIDS patients, women, disabled persons and payment of reparations in the form of compensation from colonisers. They further asked for introduction of Price Control and granting of grace period to develop own business. Salary were to be above poverty datum line and include right to participate fully in the informal sector business. IMF needed to avail funds for the economy. The people ended by saying no to so as sanctions a to help the economy grow.

17. ENVIRONMENT

Views raised on the concept Conservation/Preservation were: protection of environment; no cutting of trees; no burning of bushes or grass; protection of wild animals in the region; traditional leaders to be custodians of the environment; locals to engage in re-forestation activities; respect monuments and shrines; no to deforestation, government should encourage tree planting by providing seeds; fire guards to be mandatory; government, farmers to be involved in stopping soil erosion, banning of sledges; right to an environment that is not harmful to health and wellbeing; shrines, caves to be preserved for posterity; locals should have access to environmental decision and policy making processes.

Issues raised under Administration and Management were that there should be administration and management of the environment; government to own resources; environmental court to be established; the need for an independent commissions/board; each region must manage its own resources; promotion of environmental friendly energy sources; EMA to work with local development associations and educate local communities on environmental issues; traditional boundaries to be preserved; traditional leaders to be custodians of the environment; use of local names on buildings, streets and places of national importance; restoration of cultural rights; government to encourage tree planting; state not to mortgage natural resources; no to deforestation; government should encourage tree planting by providing seeds; and that fire guards be mandatory.

Under Regulation and Legislation the following were raised: regulation and legislation; drawing of sledges to be banned; water should be readily available; miners to rehabilitate the environment, enact environment friendly legislation; stiff penalties for companies that release pollutants into our rivers; no illegal vending of firewood; penalties for environmental offenders; no to foreign names for public places and institutions; traditional act to protect the environment; construct roads, process raw materials before exporting; no illegal sand poaching and that there should be laws that govern the operations of gold panners.

The concept Beneficiaries/Benefits had the following responses:- locals to benefit; infrastructure development in rural areas; value addition on minerals; access to market for locally produced goods; industrial development; benefits; 51% indigenisation policy; access to clean water; construction of schools, hospitals and industries; affordable viewing fees at institutions like museums for locals; rural electrification; royalties to be paid to traditional leaders; slaughter of game for public consumption on national holidays and schools to educate about it.

18 MEDIA THEMATIC-NATIONAL NARRATIVE REPORT:

Regarding the Media Thematic area, eight concepts were raised in the 10 provinces of Zimbabwe. These are: Press Media; Regulation; Content; Ownership; Access, Diversity and Plurality; Languages and Media Development respectively.

In as far as Press Freedom is concerned issues raised concerning the media are: Right to free media; Right to free Press; Freedom of expression; Freedom to news coverage; Independent media; Freedom for Practitioners; The need for journalists to report without fear or intimidation; Free Airwaves; Media Freedom to be protected by the law. It was further suggested that Journalists should have the right to free media; be able to report freely with media that is free from Political control. Over and above that the constitution should guarantee freedom of movement for Journalist and provide all liberties and freedoms and these should be clearly enshrined and protected

Other issues suggested are but not limited to: Freedom of Speech and Publication; Liberalisation of Media; Right to Information and Independent non-selective media. These and other views are shown in the table below

Under Media Regulation, it was suggested by the provinces that the constitution of Zimbabwe provides for the following: An independent media commission; Media to register; Censorship; No Pirate radio stations; Scraping of all censorship laws; State regulation; Protection of state secrets; Self-regulation; Banning of Studio 7; Media to be apolitical; No to foreign media; Media Commission; Criminalisation of false reporting; Accreditation of all journalist; Media must be monitored; Registration of journalists; No to POSA and AIPPA; Media to be licenced; No to abuse of Airwaves; The media to be protected by the government; Foreign media to be allowed; A guarantee of protection of media personnel; No to pornography; Localisation of Studio 7

Other issues raised are the following: Government to protect the media; There must be one broadcasting station; Registration not to be difficult; Respect of privacy; Repealing of repressive broadcasting laws and observing media ethics among others as shown in the table below

Regarding media Content, it was suggested that the constitution should have the following provisions: Truthful and Objective reporting; Media to be apolitical; Constructive reporting which brings development, Peace and Tranquillity to the nation: No to Pornography; the press not to cartoon the President; Journalist to respect national institutions and media must not be biased; 25% local content without hate speech; Broadcasting should provide social and cultural values ,norms and peace; Media to respect confidentiality; Media must not be biased or used to oppress. It was further expressed that Content of media should not be anti-government; All political parties to be represented fully on TV; Prohibition of Nudity on TV programmes; Respect of people's views and rights and Promotion of Ubuntu among others as shown in the table below

On media ownership it concerned it was expressed that Media must be locally owned and that there must be 50% shareholding for blacks in media houses. It was further mentioned that media should be independent and Journalists must be local; Media must be Zimbabwean based as well as state owned; Wide media coverage; Access all information with coverage of rural areas; Media practitioners should have access to all areas for purposes of gathering news. The constitution should guarantee the right to setup community stations and newspapers; to cover all government officials

Under diversity and Plurality it was suggested that there be multiple media; many media players to promote plurality; the right to community radio stations and houses; Accessibility of all areas

It was suggested by all provinces that the constitution provides for the use and promotion of all local languages in media; Sign language and Braille must be used in media; No hate language; Promotion of vernacular languages in all media must be guaranteed by the constitution; Media should be non-tribal

Under Media development it was suggested that the constitution must promote community radio stations; Booster for communication to be installed with transmission systems for radio and TV that cover all areas; there must be extensive and decentralised media coverage to be enshrined in the constitution. These and other issues expressed are shown in the table below

Bill of Rights

19. BILL OF RIGHTS

The people of Zimbabwe, with regards to the Bill of Rights on the concept of Fundamental Rights expressed the following views: Life, freedom of and after speech, health, vote and be voted for, right to protection, right to rule of law, access to information, freedom of association, protection against discrimination, accessible education, movement, shelter, choice, no to homosexuality and lesbianism, liberty, acquisition of registration documents in locality, land, right to co-operatives and projects, food, benefits from local resources and fairness in administrative issues.

On the same concept of Fundamental Rights the people suggested that there be protection from intimidation, privacy, human dignity and reputation, freedom of assembly, clean and safe environment, heterosexual marriage, wealth, access to clean water, wages above poverty-datum line, free political affiliation, pensions for the elderly, equality before the law, freedom from harassment, respect, protection against arbitrary arrest and harassment by police, right to good governance, residence in Zimbabwe, use local currency, access to media in indigenous languages, protection by the law, strike, social welfare for all vulnerable groups, children to be taught in their mother language, right to outlaw abortion, fair trial and press freedom.

Further views were that pregnant girls should be readmitted in schools, no forced labour, collective bargaining, equality, free health, respect of private property, freedom from domestic violence, protection of children rights, free and fair elections, gender equality in ownership of wealth and women's right to inheritance. Protection from arbitrary searches without state security identification, educational grants, no to forced and arranged marriages, provision of local agricultural markets, form and or join any trade unions and the right to be heard. Other rights suggested were the right to participate in international human rights and they must be implemented, no to Satanism, timely justice system, no to torture, self-rule, recognition of women's rights, defend national sovereignty, no racial discrimination, no to violence during elections, right to access information, legal representation, no beating of people to influence votes, to have SADC and AU monitors and observers during elections.

The other views suggested were conscience, an independent commission to bestow hero status, no to stigmatisation of HIV positive people, election date to be enshrined in the constitution, protection of minority rights, have an accountable police, self-determination, security forces to be non-partisan, freedom to move livestock, no discrimination of scholars, minimum academic qualification for members of parliament, right to self-reliance, right to sexual preference, free legal representation for the poor, people to be consulted in major national decisions, self-sufficiency, state assistance on repatriation of deceased, child support grants and right to international relations.

On the concept on Socio- Economic and Cultural Rights the people of Zimbabwe suggested that there be rights of education, freedom of expression, recognise cultural diversity and practise one's culture/tradition, religion, economic empowerment, employment, equitable share of natural resources, own land, free economic activity, own property, easy access to loans without collateral, exploit minerals, right to one's language, protection of property, freedom from exploitation and slavery, right to use homestead as collateral, repeal the acts POSA and AIIPA, peace and unity despite political differences, 50-50 representation, right to sue the government, free primary education, right to infrastructure, gender equality, right to have a dual citizenship, free maternity health care, human rights to be enforced by the bill of rights, equitable economic empowerment, employment in local opportunities, acquisition of identity registration without spouse, quota allocation for natural resources discovery, protection from state security organs, and fully paid maternity leave after the 3rd child.

People also suggested that voting should include foreign based citizens and any amendments to bill of rights should be done through a referendum. Other views were right to electricity and accurate billing, use of indigenous languages in public offices, no to forced political affiliation, land to have title deeds, respect the family institution and respect customary marriage. The people went on to propose rights to recognise labour rights, decentralisation of essential services to provinces, districts and local areas, right to choose leader of your own choice, food security, right to development, protection against discrimination of disabled, freedom to criticize government, right to procreation, right to good sanitation, loans for the elderly, freedom to openly talk about irregularities like gukurahundi, parental discipline up to the age of 16, right to be represented by local people, national wealth to assist indigenous people, right to total control of natural resources, traditional leaders to receive salaries, supremacy of the constitution, the right of citizens to impeach leadership and reduce presidential powers. People suggested the retention of Lobola and the right to agricultural activities.

Other views echoed were rights to indigenous empowerment, right to abortion e.g. in cases of rape and incest, no interference in internal affairs, no to polygamy, fair distribution of land to natives of each community, old age pension, formalise informal businesses, recognition of war veterans, respect for traditional leaders, protection from organized violence, gender balance in education, sustainable economy, right to unemployment benefits, right for HIV positive people to receive monthly social welfare grants, women control over their reproduction, equal opportunities between n'angas and doctors, heads of state not to use state machinery when conducting political party business, personal empowerment, no to child labour, right to intellectual property, affordable rents, title deeds for physical property and development, fair treatment at workplace, provision of dams, right for children to inherit parents' estate, corporal punishment, legal age of majority to be increased, strike by civil servants and no to title deeds but 99yr leases.

Other views echoed were the right to a corruption free society, revisit the suppression of witchcraft act, security of tenure, protection of national interests, no to tribalism, right to citizenship and voting for foreigners, vernacular languages in job interviews, respect of girl child, right to regulate religious groups, fair land allocation, preserve and protect shrines and monuments, gender equality in salaries, life employment, protection against rape/castrate rapists, former presidents should go on trial for crimes committed during his tenure of office, no to death penalty and social grants for patients with communicable diseases.

Other views were the right to cultural practises in succession in traditional leadership, love, easy access to self-registration without adults, tax for widows, right not to be abused politically, no to modelling and beauty pageants, title and rights for mineral resources, earn interest from money deposited in the bank, devolution of power and resources, abortion on medical recommendation of at least 3 practitioners, right to transport, decent clothing, local shareholding in companies, nationalise mining sector, legalise smoking of dagga, government to control commodity pricing, devolution of power, right to title deeds in rural areas, no exploitation of natural resources by foreigners, no to death penalty for culpable homicide and no to distribution of condoms.

There were other views that there should be right of entry to public offices, access to the history of the country, mines to pay royalties, retention of the patriarchy, vocational training centres, ban public drinking, cross border movement for communities, more authority for chiefs, land not to be sold, access to traditional court system, no to mercy killing, chiefs to be non-partisan, respect of election results, women participation in business activities, single farm ownership,no illegal possession of fire arms, free medication for the elderly, right to monogamy, respect for prisoners, right to donor assistance, right to self-employment, removal of abusive religious and traditional practises, access to modern technology, ease of business licensing, land not to be repossessed, access mining documents, women ownership of land, all rights as stated in the united nations bill of rights, free transport for the elderly, promote adult literacy, agricultural extension and training centres.

Other views echoed included the right to choose chiefs, laws not to be put forward by individuals, right to self-defence, domesticate UN Human Rights Charter, initiation of girls, right to use talents freely, prisoners to work in local areas for community service, no to corruption, no to incest and pornographic literature, no to statutory rape, accountable administration, regulate bride prize, civil protection, right to recall non performing members of parliament, a day set aside for rain prayers, no to political bases, reduction of bureaucracy in employment acquisition, pensions for war collaborators, stiffer penalties for those who further deforestation, no to negotiation of lobola after death, national youth service for youths, disabled to access braille and sign language, right to free and compulsory immunisation and women to also be appointed as traditional leaders.

Other views were the right to compensation if displaced, easy access to foreign direct investments, protection against arbitrary displacement, right to be buried in local community, to be assisted by a person of choice when voting, rapists to get death penalty, police not to abuse the elderly, local value addition of minerals, affordable inputs for productive sectors, right to elect traditional leaders by ballot and prompt assistance from the police. Further views were the right to monogamy for women only, right to sports and recreation, free veterinary services, all vernacular languages to be used in Parliament and no to multiple sexual partners.

On the issue of death penalty some said yes, there was a divided opinion and some said no.

21. RELIGION

The views expressed include the need for freedom of worship for all religions and freedom of worship and association as well as the preservation of religious liberty. In terms of Satanism, the view is that it has no place in society and there is also a call to ban extreme religions and abolish bogus sects. In addition the view is that homosexuality and same sex marriages be abolished, and that homosexuality should be criminalised.

In addition the supremacy of God is acknowledged. Further there is call for respect for good cultural values and norms and that there is need to respect monuments and shrines. There is a call for apolitical religious groups, and that religious groups should be apolitical and that there should be no political meddling and sloganeering by churches. There is also a view that religious groups need to uphold human rights and promote peace and unity where everyone can worship without fear and intimidation. In addition the views are that religious groups should participate in politics; that they should not prohibit inter-marriages; and that places of worship should have proper sanitation.

Churches are also called upon to promote child rights by affording them health care and rejecting forced marriages; and also act on those who abuse children in the name of religion. In addition the churches are called upon to uphold women rights and reject forced marriages. The other views are: that churches should be registered; that they should not be registered as private companies; that they should not be registered; that they need to observe the rules of the country; recognise the national flag and no to churches that cover faces and leave eyes.

In addition the views are that the African traditional beliefs must be upheld; and that churches should not defile sacred places; that religious groups need to be represented in parliament; that a ministry of religion needs to be established; that Zimbabwe be declared a Christian state or nation; and that Christianity be recognised as the official religion. In terms of regulation, the views were: that there is need for a regulatory Board/ Council; that there should be two religious groupings namely Christianity and African tradition; that there should be a commission on African religion.

The other views raised include: no to polygamy; the recognition of the existence of witchcraft; that land should not be sold to churches; that churches should not be commercialised; that religion should be part of the school curriculum; and that religion should not be run as a business.

DISABLED

The views expressed with regards to Disabled were that there should be state assistance, right to free education, right to employment, free health and right to represent themselves in Parliament without discrimination. Other views were that there should also be free public transport, accessible amenities, vocational and skills training, Economic Empowerment, Braille and sign languages as well as free assistive devices as some of the rights to the Disabled.

Further views were that there should also be rights to rehabilitation including community based rehabilitation, ministerial representation, registration of disabled, disability commission, and others suggested that the disabled be given preferential treatment as well as a right to political leadership.

There were also indications of other rights which included the right to vote, right to access information, right to marriage, right to food and clothing, right to integrated schools, right to quota system and that they be exempted from duty and taxes whilst getting protection from all forms of abuse. Some views expressed were that care givers should receive government support.

LABOUR

Under this Theme, the views which the people wanted to be included in the constitution are shown below. They are classified under eleven concepts which act as subheadings.

1. REMUNERATION

Specific provision needed to be made on the need to pay all workers adequate remuneration, living wages and give pay on time in monetary terms not in kind. Salaries should be gazette, above PDL (Poverty Datum Line) and the remuneration must be commensurate with qualifications as well as paid on merit. All these they said, should be constituted as a fundamental rights accorded equally to both men and women in adequate amounts including civil servants.

The rights to collective bargaining, tax reduction, provision of pay slips whose deductions therein must be proportionate to one's net salary or payouts were also advocated for in the new constitution.

The people further called for the prohibition of the culture of paying incentives to all teachers by parents saying that teachers must be paid adequate salaries by the government.

HEALTH AND SAFETY

The views expressed on this particular concept called for the inclusion of the rights to protective clothing, compensation of workers when injured at work, observation of health and safety regulations, mandatory provision of medical aid to all workers and subsequently, periodic checkups.

3. LEAVE RIGHTS

There were calls to the effect that constitution must enshrine the provision of leave such as vocational, sick, study, special, compassionate and above all maternity. More importantly covering all these leaves was a fundamental fact that all leave must always be granted by the employer on full pay.

WORKER BENEFIT

The response advocated for the institutionalization of worker benefits in the new constitution. This they agreed would ensure effective protection of the proletariat. The particular benefits to be included are provision of accommodation, giving of workers shares in their companies, annual bonus, over time pay and provision of transport.

CONDITION OF SERVICE

The responses advocated for inclusion of good conditions of service to employees at all facets of work places. The people's views were that there should be prevention of slavery and servitude. They said that all forms discrimination must be outlawed at every work place. The views were explicitly in saying the constitution must say no nepotism, grant rights to arbitration, freedom of association, freedom of expression, sue employers when they do not pay them well and also have the right of first preferential claim on liquidation of the company. The other aspect raised was that of mutual respect between the employer and his employees.

6. EMPLOYMENT CONTRACT

The constitution should include mandatory provision of a contract of employment for every worker. The contract should stipulate 8 working hours per day. Outlaw child labor, respect government rules and regulations, prevent unfair labor practice at work places, prohibit unlawful dismissals, and provide three months mandatory notice on termination, issue proper job description and above all issue a written contract of employment to every employee.

7. TRADE UNIONS

Specific provisions were that, workers must be allowed to freely form trade unions, register them in terms of the law and be allowed to participate in all their *bona fide* activities. The constitution must also provide for the right to collective bargaining and allow the unions to be either political or apolitical. The other made were that trade unions must be free to partake on all those activities that champion workers interest. The people further added that there should be an independent labour commission established for the regulation of worker's issues. In conclusion, there was a view advocating for worker representation in parliament/government.

8. INDUSTRIAL ACTION/STRIKE ACTION

Some views were for the granting of right to strike, whilst others were of the view that every other worker should be allowed to strike/demonstrate except civil servants and those engaged in essential services. The other submission was that there should be no strike at all. They

further said that there should be 14 days' notice before any strike action can be embarked on by workers.

9. PENSION AND RETIREMENT

The view was that, pension should be an enshrined right to every worker in Zimbabwe. The retirement age raged from 45, 60 or 65 and their pension benefits should be easily accessible and quickly paid out. They advocated for a mandatory social security scheme for those retiring at 60 years Pension was to be statutory and set at 50% of one's pay at the time of retirement. Pension contribution to NSSA by workers should attract interest to benefit contributors and the pension package should be sustainable based on the policy of the living benefits.

10. INTERNATIONAL CONVENTIONS

These should be domesticated through provision of the new constitution.

11. OTHER ISSUES

The other host of views raised for inclusion in the constitution are the honouring of the workers day, right to join political parties of own choice, limitation of all short term contracts to a maximum of three months where after such employees must be made permanent. This they said should be supported by the establishment of a labor court to enforce this aspect among others.

They called for the constitution to embrace a job reservation policy for the local people, establishment of a quick dispute resolution mechanism where workers should be assisted with free legal representations. Upon death of the worker, the surviving family's members should be given holistic funeral assistance by the employer and accorded quick release of the deceased's terminal benefits. The people further said that the constitution should make it compulsory that workers easily access loans, enjoy all forms of protection by law, are given on job training, quickly receive their terminal benefits when they leave service for whatever reason and be protected from all forms of abuse. The people submitted that all forms of workplace corruption must be must prohibited by the new constitution.

CHILDREN'S PARLIAMENT 2. ARMS OF THE STATE

The Children's Parliament suggested that Executive powers be vested in the: President; King; President and Prime Minister and Prime Minister only with other views agreeing to have both appointed by a popular vote through a general election and the Prime Minister to be appointed from a party with a majority in Parliament. It was further expressed that All Ministers should be MP's and that they be appointed by the President; By the Executive on Merit and by the Prime Minister respectively

It was suggested that there be two houses of Parliament while the other view was that there be one house of assembly. There was a divided opinion on MP's who are appointed. It was further acknowledged that MP's should not be allowed to cross floor with their seats, however there was a divided opinion on the same issue

There should be Parliamentary seats reserved for Women and the Disabled whilst there was a divided opinion on Parliamentary seats to be reserved for: Traditional Leaders; Disabled and Special interest groups.

The need to add a constitutional court to the current setup of the court system was outlined with another view advocating for the maintenance of the status quo.It was further suggested that the President appoints Judges on merit while others suggested that they be appointed by an independent commission

There were three major concepts that were raised under the Traditional Institutions thematic. Notable among these included: Recognition, Protection and Continuation of traditional leaders; Functions, Duties and responsibilities; Relations with government/Parliament.

Under recognition, protection and continuity of traditional leader's concept, participants felt that their power and authority should be escalated.

The children's Parliament expressed the need for handover takeover period to be within one week; two weeks; 3 months; Two days and 1 month respectively. In the event of incapacitation of a sitting President the Vice President will be acting President, for a period of one month before elections whilst other views were that he/she acts for a period of 6months; 1 week; 2months respectively. It was further expressed that the transitional authority be vested in the chairman of the ruling party; Speaker of parliament; First Presidential runner up and former President.

It was noted that Councilors, MPs and Senators assume office immediately; 7 days; 48 hours; two weeks; one month and three months respectively. The by-elections for the above Public Offices to be carried out in 3 months; 6 months; 2 months and one week respectively. The children's Parliament further suggested that there should be 2 five year terms whilst another view was that there should be a 1 five year term for the President.

Participants felt that War veterans should be defined as those who died before independence while another view was that they be defined as those in the structures from 1964-1980; those who fought in the liberation war. It was further expressed that War veterans be defined as those who continue to fight for the development of the country whilst others suggested that they be defined as war collaborators, ex-combatants and those who provided logistical support.

The need for a National War Veterans Commission was expressed. It was further suggested that war veterans have: Right to receive government gratuities; Right to economic support; Right to bank loans; Right to elect leaders of own choice.

CHILDREN'S PARLIAMENT 19. BILL OF RIGHTS

The children parliament submissions on the bill of rights can be categorized as follows Socio-economic and political rights. Issues raised pertains to freedoms and liberties that human beings in general and children in particular should enjoy as enshrined in the UN declaration on Human rights. Social rights that the constitution should include free health care and education, free examinations, right to have identity documents, right to be heard and equal treatment for both and girls. These and other rights are clearly illustrated in the table below.

Political rights as raised by the children are as follows: Participation in democracy through the constitutional provisions of the Junior parliament which has the budgetary allocation for its activities. It was further expressed that there must be freedom of expression and association, corporal punishment must be outlawed and the legal age majority to be 21 years. The table below summarizes all the key concepts and responses that were raised in this thematic.

Economic rights suggested by the Children's Parliament are that the government must support economic projects for the youth; Ownership of shares in mines; Access to land by the people with capacity; the constitution to provide for BEE. The rights and others are as per the table attached

Culturally the constitution should provide for equal treatment of boys and girls, protection from child labour and all forms of abuse, freedom of religion, right to inheritance, criminalization of prostitution and baby dumping, right to marriage at 18 years of age.

Other issue raised by the children's Parliament include: Protection of the environment; Support for children living on the streets and with HIV and AIDS, BEAM should be extended to University level, There was a divided opinion on death penalty. These submissions and others are as per table below.

The constitutional provisions that were raised by the children's parliament are in six categories i.e. remuneration, health and safety, leave, employee benefits, employment contracts, pensions and retirement respectively. It was suggested that teachers be adequately remunerated. All civil servants to be paid salaries that are above the Poverty Datum Line (PDL). Teachers' incentives should be banned and must be paid by the Government. Regarding health and safety, the constitution should enshrine the workers' rights to friendly working conditions, compensation for injury at work and the observation of health and safety regulations. The constitution should guarantee employee rights to vacation leave, fully paid maternity leave and paternity leave. Workers must have 12% of company profits and employment contracts should clearly stipulate working hour's i.e. up to 8 hours a day. Workers to have the right to pension.

2. ARMS OF THE STATE

The views captured from the institutions on Executive powers indicate that it should be vested in the Executive President, Prime Minister, President and Cabinet, President and one Vice President, Cabinet, Separation of powers/Executive, Judiciary and Legislature.

Details into types of leadership highlighted that the Institutions felt that there should be President or both President and Prime Minister.

On appointment issue the Institutions mentioned that there should be a general election for both the President and Prime Minister with an additional view that the Prime Minister should come from a party with majority in Parliament.

In question of whether Ministers should be MPs, the Institutions pointed out that there should be MPs and others not. It was the Institutions feeling that Ministers should be appointed on merit and or by the President and Parliament.



They further felt that the Constitution should enshrine the right to have one or two houses of Parliament, but they disagreed on the appointment of MPs and the right of MPs crossing the floor with their seats. There was a divided opinion on the issue of reserved seats for women and traditional leaders but agree on disabled's favour.

Apart from the above and on how our Court Systems should be organised the Institutions, highlighted that the System should remain as is, and Judicial Service Commission. The appointment of Judges as it was put by the Institutions the officials shall be appointed by the President and Judicial Service Commission, Parliament and Judicial Service Commission and Attorney General.

3. SYSTEMS OF GOVERNMENT

Unitary and Devolved are the two systems mentioned. The Institutions appeared divided on the issue of Provincial Governments. They want local elected Governors and Provincial Councils or Governors appointed by the Parliament.

The Institutions indicated that they want a Devolved structures or decentralised government offices starting from Traditional Leaders, Councillors/MPs/Provincial Administrators/Governors.

The Institutions also want elected Local Governments with necessary qualifications /competence/potential capacity, which are appointed by Parliament, but maintain the current set up which govern the affairs of their communities subject to national and provincial governments.

An Act of Parliament will provide for the establishment and powers of the local government institution, including by-laws and regulations and levy rates and taxes.

In terms of development they are to spearhead development (social, economic and infrastructural), social amenities, borrow funds for development of their areas and create employment.

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Furthermore the Institutions indicated that the Local Government should advise central government, bring business of government closer to the people/implement government policy, deal with all governance issues, craft their own budgets/taxation powers and do revenue collection, be given adequate resources to run their constituencies, distribute land, have a devolved system of government at local level, ensure natural resources benefit their communities and to ensure equitable distribution of the Provincial budget.

The number of Provinces suggested by the Institutions are 10, 5 and 4, to be determined as currently constituted or in the case of five; Manicaland, Mashonaland, Matabeleland, Midlands, Masvingo, and or cardinal points (North, East, West, South).

8. TRADITIONAL INSTITUTIONS

The views expressed on Traditional Institutions are that the Constitution should recognise Traditional leaders (Izinduna, Sabhuku, Abalisa), traditional culture and values, and that their court systems should be respected.

In respect of the method of selection/appointment the Institutions highlighted that there should be no corruption in chieftainship appointments.

The Functions, Duties And Responsibilities were stated as follows; preserve culture, tradition, history and heritage, intervene on disputes, should not be corrupt when trying cases, be custodians of sacred shrines, enforce traditional and customary laws, must not have judicial powers but retain administrative powers, ensure people dress decently and have jurisdiction over communal cases.

It was also mentioned that Traditional Institutions must be involved in community development programmes, have the right to parliamentary representation, should constitute a commission for chiefs, be included in Provincial and Local Governments, be apolitical/non-partisan, respect legislation and constitution and be remunerated by the state.

19. BILL OF RIGHTS

The Fundamental Rights enunciated by the Institutions are access to information, life, liberty, protection against discrimination, freedom of and after speech, freedom of association, accessible education, health, access to clean water, freedom of assembly, respect, protection from intimidation, human dignity and reputation, free political affiliation, clean and safe environment, fairness in administrative issues and food.

Further their feelings were that there should be no to homosexuality and lesbianism, shelter, acquisition of registration documents in locality, freedom from harassment, land, right to rule of law, choice, privacy, free health, press freedom, protection against arbitrary arrest and harassment by police, protection by the law, to be heard, social welfare for all vulnerable groups, no to forced and arranged marriages, no discrimination of scholars, legal representation, recognition of women's rights, no to torture, protection of children rights, equality and respect of private property.

Further they mentioned that there should be free and fair elections, right to outlaw abortion, right to participate in international human rights, and they must be implemented, right to access information, no to stigmatisation of HIV positive people and no to violence during elections.

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In respect of Socio-Economic and Cultural Rights the Institutions aired the following; Religion, education, employment, own land, protection of property, own property, right to electricity and accurate billing, freedom of expression, right to good sanitation, protection from state security organs and freedom from exploitation and slavery.

In addition to the above, the Institutions felt that there should be free primary education, parental discipline up to the age of 16, fair treatment at workplace, acquisition of identity registration without spouse, protection against discrimination of disabled, food security, right to public offices, gender equality in salaries, no to polygamy, nationalisation of the mining sector, protection from corporal punishment, decent clothing, free medication for the elderly, protection against rape/castrate rapists, respect the family institution, respect customary marriage, retain lobola, legalise smoking of dagga, supremacy of the constitution and any amendments to bill of rights should be done through a referendum.

It was further stated that chiefs should be non-partisan, police should not abuse the elderly, disabled should have access to braille and sign language, land to have title deeds, gender balance in education, child labour should be illegal, there be easy access to self-registration without adults and no to multiple sexual partners.

The rights further mentioned are right to cultural practises in succession in traditional leadership, love, protection against arbitrary displacement, not to be abused politically, all rights as stated in the united nations bill of rights, citizenship, free maternity health care, choice, rapists to get death penalty, no to distribution of condoms, respect of girl child, sports and recreation and protection from organized violence.

The Institutions disagreed on the death penalty issue.

A divided opinion was reached on MPs who are appointed. Another divided opinion was expressed on whether MPs should be allowed to cross the floor. At the same time it was raised that reserved seats for the disabled be there and point's special interest groups being represented in Parliament. Status quo on the organization on the court system to be maintained. There must be constitutional and traditional courts. Judges are appointed by the President, Parliament and the Judicial services commission or the President and Parliament.

SENATE CHAMBERS 3. SYSTEMS OF GOVERNMENT

On systems of government to be used in Zimbabwe participants in the Senate Chamber suggested two systems of government, i.e. unitary and devolved state respectively. A divided opinion was expressed on the existence of provincial governments whilst other views advocated for the status quo to be maintained. It was suggested that Provincial Governors should be appointed by the President, President in consultation with Parliament while some suggested that they be elected. Provincial governments' composition to be as follows traditional leaders, councilors/MPs/Provincial Administrators and Governors. There was a general consensus that local governments be part of the system of governments and these are to be elected and their functions include, but are not limited to spearheading development, creating employment, service delivery, addressing people's grievances, ensuring equal distribution of resources, providing overall administration as well as maintaining the status quo. It was suggested that the Mayor should be elected and in turn appoint Executive Commissioners. It was expressed that the incumbents for local and provincial governments' posts have the necessary qualifications, competencies or potential capacity. On the number of provinces, participants in the Senate Chamber suggested that there be ten and five provinces respectively and these are determined by population density and the status quo to be maintained.

The Ombudsman, it was suggested that he/she be appointed by the President, President in Consultation with Parliament and should be non-partisan. Functions of the AG are that he/she is the Legal Advisor to government and Chief Prosecutor who is non-partisan.

8. TRADITIONAL INSTITUTIONS

Traditional leaders' authority and power should be increased and their power escalated. It was also suggested that they should be respected and their court systems should be recognised. The Ndebele kingdom should be revived. It was further expressed that traditional leaders be installed according to traditional practices, on tribal lines and clan whilst other views want them to be voted for. The duties of traditional leaders are Preservation of culture, tradition and heritage, fair treatment of subjects, performing rituals, ruling independently, being custodians of sacred shrines and administrators of land and law. The Consolidated Revenue Fund shall have custody at the RBZ External borrowing to be authorized by Parliament which plays an oversight role on public finance. National budget to be drawn from provincial budget through grassroots and stakeholders consultations with parliament. There must not be any spending outside national budget. SENATE CHAMBERS 18. MEDIA

Concepts that were raised on the Media Thematic area are Press freedom; Regulation; Content; Access; Diversity and Plurality; Languages and Media Development respectively.

On press freedom, it was suggested that there should be freedom to news coverage; Freedom of expression; Right to free press; Freedom of practitioners to be guaranteed; independent media to be guaranteed; journalist should have the right to media; media should be independent; free airwaves to be guaranteed; media to be free from political control; freedom of information to be guaranteed and the control of press freedom by the state.

Regarding media regulation, it was suggested that an Independent Media Commission be set up and that Media be registered. It was further proposed that media registration should not be difficult; and that Foreign radio stations be embraced. The need for licensing scrapping of censorship laws and truthful reporting was also raised.

The constitution to guarantee access to media with wide coverage including in rural areas and that the right to setup community stations and newspapers. On diversity and plurality it was suggested that media plurality in all local languages be promoted. It was further expressed that suggested that media should be non-tribal. In as far as media development is concerned, it was proposed that media equipment should be expanded and the promotion of community radio stations be guaranteed.

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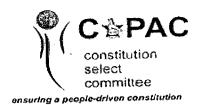

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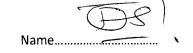

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2. ARMS OF THE STATE

The views expressed on the Arms of the State indicate that the Executive powers be vested in the Executive President, Prime Minister, Separation Of Powers / Executive, Judiciary And Legislature, President And One Vice President, President Head Of State And Prime Minister Head Of Government, Ceremonial President And Prime Minister, President and Cabinet, President and One Vice President, Prime Minister and One Vice Prime Minister.

In terms of the Leadership type views mentioned are the President and the Prime Minister.

On how the President and or the Prime Minister come into office the people proposed that the President be elected in a general election and then be sworn by the Chief Justice. There should be general elections for the Prime Minister, or be appointed by Parliament or the President.

On the question of all Ministers being M.P'S there was a divided opinion, and it was agreed that all Ministers should not be M.P'S. Apart from the above, on the appointment of Ministers views mentioned are that they should be appointed by the President, Parliament, Parliament and Judiciary, on merit, on Legal qualification and experience, election, Prime Minister, both President and Prime Minister, President and Parliament, and Prime Minister and Parliament. Also the community felt that there should either one or two houses of Parliament. The community rejected the appointment of Members of parliament, but there was a divided opinion on whether Members of parliament should be allowed to cross the floor with their seats. On reserved seats for women the community said no, and there was a divided opinion on traditional leaders, disabled and the special interest groups.

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The respondents are of the opinion that our courts should be organised as follows; Presidential court, Judicial Service Commission courts, Special courts, Chief's courts, Small claims, Labour, Labour, Administrative Court, Family Court, Customary Law Court, Magistrates, High Court, Supreme and Constitutional Court, Electoral Court and International courts.

The respondents proposed that Judges should be appointed by the President, on merit, by the President in consultation with the Prime Minister, Parliament, Judicial Service Commission, Political Parties and that there should be Non-partisan.

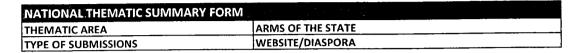

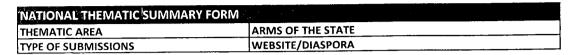

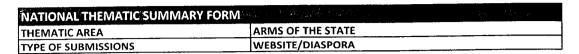

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3. SYSTEMS OF GOVERNMENT

Federal and Devolved are the two systems mentioned. The community said yes to Provincial Governments.

Views mentioned on Type of Government are Provincial Governments, Provincial Assembly reporting to central government, Elected Provincial Councils and devolved system. They felt that they should be appointed by the President, Parliament, on merit and with a proposal that Governors be elected by councillors, electorate and by proportional representation.

The community aired out that there should be devolved structures/Decentralise government offices and do away with chiefs.

In terms of Tenure the community felt that the Governor and Councillors voted for should have one 5 year term, the Provincial Governor should serve a maximum two 5 year terms, the Head of State and MPs 5 years and Local Government 4 years. Officials elected to be non-partisan.

A local government institution will govern the affairs of its community subject to national and provincial governments. Office bearers i.e. elected Councillors or Mayors should have the necessary qualifications/competence/potential capacity. There should be provision of a moderator and a deputy.

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An Act of Parliament will provide for the establishment and powers of the local government institution, including by-laws and regulations and levy rates and taxes.

On functions of Provincial and Local Governments the community has a feeling that there should be formulate policies that raise revenue in their areas, enact and enforce by-laws, development and maintenance of infrastructure, attract investors, promote peace, spearhead development (social, economic and infrastructural) and social amenities.

On Administration Provincial Governments should craft their own budgets, taxation powers and do revenue collection. They should practice a devolved system of local Governance.

The suggested number of Provinces was 10, 5 and 8, determined as follows; as it is/status quo, not named on tribal grounds, current names are fine, Manicaland, Mashonaland, Matabeleland, Midlands, Masvingo plus one, Eastern, Western, Southern, Northern and Central and Geographical demarcation.

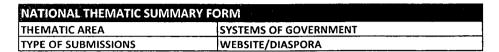

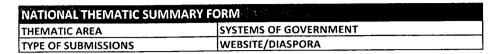

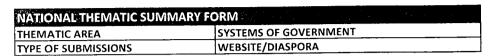

5. INDEPENDENT PUBLIC OFFICES

The suggested Independent Public Offices mentioned are Attorney General, Auditor and Comptroller General, Public protector/ Ombudsman and Zimbabwe Electoral Commission.

The above offices shall be appointed by Parliament and the President in consultation with the Judicial Service Commission.

As far as the Attorney General is concerned the community felt that he or she shall be appointed by the President, Judicial Commission and the person shall be non-partisan. In respect of the Auditor/Comptroller General and the Public Protector/Ombudsman the general feeling of the community was that the two shall be appointed by the President or on merit respectively.

The suggested functions of the Attorney General are Chief prosecutor, sits in cabinet, shall be a Member of Parliament and those functions that are currently ascribed to his office.

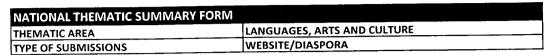

8. TRADITIONAL INSTITUTIONS

Traditional leaders (Izinduna, Sabhuku, Abalisa) should be in the constitution and their court systems to be recognised and respected.

In as much as for the Selection/Appointment it was the community's feeling that women should also be appointed traditional leaders and that all traditional leaders should be trained by the judiciary and educated to a minimum education standard.

In respect of functions, duties and responsibilities of traditional leaders, it was also felt that there should be preservation of culture, tradition, history and heritage. Traditional leaders should preside over village courts, submit, report cases to magistrates courts for checking, intervene on family disputes, enforce traditional and customary laws, deal with communal land issues, be custodians but not administrators of land and law, manage natural resources and promote Zunde Ramambo. Traditional leaders should also be included in provincial and local governments, apolitical and impartial.

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9. TRANSITIONAL MECHANISMS

The respondents on Handover Takeover (time period)mentioned that it be done immediately, 24 Hours (One Day), 5 Days (Five), 3 Days (Three), Two Weeks (14 Days), 1 Month (30 Days), 7 Days (One Week), 2 Days (48 Hours), Within 21 days and within 90 days.

On who takes over during incapacitation, respondents felt that it should be the Speaker of Parliament, Independent Commission, Vice President and the Chief Justice. The incapacitation period shall be 3 Months (90 Days), One Month (30 Days), 6 Months, Two Months, One week and or two (2) weeks.

Apart from the above the respondents felt that the term of office for the President shall be a 1x5 Year Term. Election results shall be released within 24 Hours (One Day), 48 Hours (2 Days), 5 Days (Five) and or one week.

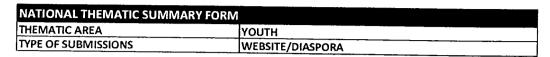

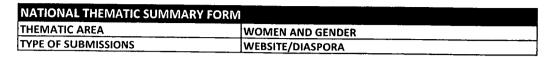

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12. PUBLIC FINANCE

In respect of Public Finance and revenue collection in particular the people mentioned the following that revenue should be collected through taxes and duties and levies. As for the management the people have the feeling that there should be a central bank that should be given limited borrowing powers and exercise transparency.

In terms of supervision and Oversight people mentioned that there should be a Board of Directors/Governors, overseeing by the Ministry of finance, Reserve Bank of Zimbabwe and Parliament.

When formulating the budget the grassroots should be consulted and its details should be published in all languages. Management of same should be apolitical and tender system should be transparent.

Apart from the above and on accountability and transparent issues there should be an Act of Parliament, annual audited reports, a report by the Finance Minister to parliament quarterly, and an Independent audit.

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The functions of the RBZ and Monetary Policy in particular, the community mentioned the following; control of inflation, regulate local currency, taxes and interests rates. Other functions of the RBZ as they are mentioned by the people are advisor to government, lender of last resort, local bank supervision, promotion of economic development and quasi fiscal activities.

The community mentioned that the RBZ Governor should be appointed by Parliament, President, Ministry of Finance, on merit and the person should be appolitical.

The community further highlighted that the Central Bank should be independent, have autonomy, have an Independent Commission/Board, be under the Ministry of Finance and should publicise government expenditure.

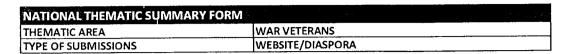

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14. LAND

The respondents on Land Reform mentioned that land should remain state land, land reform is irreversible, land reform to continue, redistribution of land to continue, no 99yr lease and that the land reform is illegal.

In respect of the land Tenure, the same community mentioned that there should be 99 year lease, title deeds, security of tenure and leasehold.

In as much as land administration is concerned they mentioned the following: land should be owned by Zimbabweans, equitable distribution of land, land audit, one man one farm policy, land commission, Independent Land Commission, productive use of land, no compensation and no multiple farms.

The community also mentioned that there should be no discrimination on land distribution, land should be demarcated as per land use patterns, consider productivity, local communities to benefit first, compensation to be paid, consider expertise, distribution be apolitical, disputes over land must be taken to Court, Government to allocate land. It was also community's feeling that foreigners should not own land but have leasehold, with the same community saying that foreigners should own land. Land to be sold at affordable prices with no violent dispossession of land and that land reform should conform to international and regional laws.

19. BILL OF RIGHTS

The views expressed by the community with regards to Fundamental Rights are: to vote and be voted for, access to information, life, protection against discrimination, freedom of and after speech, freedom of association, freedom from fear, right to protection, accessible education, health, access to clean water, freedom of assembly, human dignity and reputation, free political affiliation, clean and safe environment, form and or join any trade unions, right to picketing, heterosexual marriage and administrative justice.

Further views mentioned are: benefits from local resources, right to food, permanent residence must be allowed to vote, no to homosexuality and lesbianism, right to shelter, acquisition of registration documents in locality, right to rule of law, right to free choice, movement, privacy, free health, press freedom, conscience, belief and thought, equality before the law, no racial discrimination and fair trial.

Apart from the above the same community mentioned the following rights: social welfare for all vulnerable groups, timely justice system, legal representation, recognition of women's rights, no to torture, protection of children rights, equality, freedom of demonstration and petition, free and fair elections, right to participate in international human rights and they must be implemented, protection of minority rights and recognition of combatants in the liberation struggle.

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In respect of the Socio-Economic and Cultural Rights a number of views were mentioned and captured as follows: right to citizenship, religion/ freedom of belief, education, recognise cultural diversity and practise one's culture/tradition, economic empowerment, employment, equitable share of natural resources, own property, right to one's language and culture, freedom of expression, free economic activity, free primary education, right to infrastructure, strike by civil servants, gender equality, yes to polygamy, equal opportunities, vocational training centres, respect the family institution, any amendments to bill of rights should be done through a referendum, right to cultural practises in succession in traditional leadership, love, user friendly infrastructure for disabled, right for HIV positive people to receive monthly social welfare grants, social responsibility, protection from abuse, copy right, no to incest and pornographic literature, domesticate un human rights charter, labour relations, right to intellectual property, trade, occupation and profession, honour the preamble of the constitution and access to courts.

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22. DISABLED

As much as the Disabled rights are concerned people felt that the constitution should enshrine the following: right of employment, no discrimination on basis of disability, state provided assistance (welfare), right to education, food, user friendly facilities, shelter, vote on braille language, health, representation in all government institutions, protection from all forms of abuse and vote.

The respondents further expressed that there should be freedom of speech, choice, equal treatment, access to information, accessible amenities, self-representation in parliament, economic empowerment, ministerial representation and rehabilitation including community based rehab.

24. LABOUR

The respondents expressed a number of views on Labour which include the following adequate remuneration/living wage to all workers, protection against domestic abuse, exploitation and equal pay to men and women.

In respect of Health and Safety the respondents felt that there should be protective clothing, compensation for injury at work, observation of Health and safety regulations, leave/vacation rights and full pay during maternity leave.

With regards to Conditions of Service respondents expressed that there should be fair labour practices, no forced labour, arbitration, abiding by labour laws and no to slavery and servitude.

The community felt that there should be stipulated working hours- up to 8 hours a day, no to child labour, form and participate in trade unions, collective bargaining, right to strike/demonstration, retirement age to be at 45, 60 or 65 and domestication of international labour laws and conventions.
