Human rights violations report for the month ending June 2013

Monitoring the pre-election human rights environment

As political temperatures rise ahead of harmonised elections scheduled for July 31st, the Media Monitoring Project Zimbabwe (MMPZ) is providing regular updates on the media's coverage of the human rights environment in the country.

This is our third report.

The reports are aimed at assessing the role Zimbabwe's mainstream domestic media are playing in reporting human rights violations during this period and whether or not preparations for the elections by the authorities are conducive to the holding of a free and fair election.

Access to information – especially about the election preparations, voter education and politically motivated human rights abuses – forms an essential part of assessing whether or not the environment is conducive to the staging of a peaceful, credible election. The media, especially radio, television and the daily and weekly press serve as the watchdogs of the nation and provide essential contemporary news about the progress, transparency and accountability of election preparations and any violations that are likely to compromise the credibility of this fundamental exercise in democracy.

What are human rights?

Human rights are complex and difficult to define. This is because they are interdependent and indivisible.

However, they are generally classified as the rights guaranteed to all people irrespective of race, creed, colour, gender or national origin. The free encyclopaedia, *Wikipedia*, presents human rights as "inalienable fundamental rights to which a person is inherently entitled simply because she or he is a human being".

Human rights are thus conceived as universal and the same for everyone. These include basic rights and freedoms to which all human beings are entitled, which are often given as the right to life and liberty, freedom of thought and expression, and equality before the law.

The Universal Declaration of Human Rights (UDHR), adopted by the United Nations General Assembly on December 10 1948 in Paris, champions the

doctrine of human rights in the world. It was a direct consequence of the atrocities of the Second World War and represented "the first global expression of rights to which all human beings are inherently entitled", according to Wikipedia.

The UDHR comprises 30 rights to which all people are entitled. These have largely been split and categorized into civil and political rights; and economic, social and cultural rights.

Civil and political rights are enshrined in articles 3 to 21 of the UDHR and in the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights (ICCPR). Economic, social and cultural rights are protected in articles 22 to 28 of the UDHR and in the International Covenant on Economic, Social and Cultural Rights (ICESCR).

The UDHR framework on human rights has since become the cornerstone of public policy in the world as reflected in global and regional institutions, in the policies of states and the activities of NGOs.

This is also reflected in Zimbabwe's new constitution (Chapter four), which is wholly dedicated to the declaration on human rights. The section encompasses and dwells at length on civil and political rights, as well as economic, social and cultural rights.

This report is therefore guided by international, regional and local practice on human rights issues in its tabulation of rights violations carried in the media.

Findings

During June, the media monitored by MMPZ reported 40 incidents of rights violations, most of which stemmed from violations of political rights.

This represented a 25% increase from last month's 32 incidents.

Of the 40 incidents, 31 (78%) appeared in the Press. Four (10%) were contained in the electronic media. The remaining five appeared in both the print and electronic media.

Nineteen (48%) of the 40 incidents were on intra and inter-party violence, which were mostly fuelled by the holding of primary elections by Zimbabwe's two main parties.

Thirteen were on complaints over irregularities in the mobile voter registration and inspection exercise and bias by the national broadcaster, ZBC.

Eight (20%) were on alleged abuses by state security agents, who were reported as intimidating Zimbabweans, especially those in rural areas, to vote for President Mugabe and his party.

The rest (three) were violations of civil liberties.
